

Korrektur der Aufgaben

Bitte kreuzen Sie bei jeder Frage im Bereich mit dem Hinweis "von der Lehrperson auszufüllen" an, ob die Kandidatin/der Kandidat die Frage richtig oder falsch beantwortet hat.

Falls Sie versehentlich das falsche Kästchen markieren, malen Sie es bitte vollständig aus (■) und kreuzen das richtige an (区).



Gibt eine Kandidatin/ein Kandidat bei einer Frage zwei Antworten an und ist eine davon falsch, so ist die gesamte Antwort als falsch zu werten. Bei der Testmethode *Kurzantworten* zählen alle Wörter, die nicht durchgestrichen sind, zur Antwort.

The speaker says: "A tall thin man sits up in bed with a typewriter on his knees, chain-smoking. The air is thick with smoke. [...] <u>He looks worn, ill and tired and is coughing</u>." George Orwell, the man who is described, therefore seems to be sick.

1

The speaker says: "Outside a winter storm sweeps the rocky moorland and below waves batter the shore. The nearest phone is eight miles away and it's another 25 miles to the nearest shop, where steamers bring supplies twice a week to the island." The place where George Orwell is staying is therefore far away from public facilities.

2

The speaker says: "He's feeling awful but he is gnawed by the suspicion that seldom leaves him that <u>he is behind with his work and should have done more</u>." George Orwell therefore feels that he needs to try harder.

3

The speaker says: "George Orwell, whose real name was in fact Eric Arthur Blair, <u>was born in India</u> on the 25th of June 1903 and died in hospital in London on the 21st of January 1950, a year after I was born." George Orwell's life therefore began on a different continent.

4

The speaker says: "His last years were spent in near isolation on that remote island of Jura in the Scottish Hebrides [...]." Towards the end of his life, Orwell therefore lived in a distant place.

5

The speaker says: "An author of fiction, polemical journalism, literary criticism and poetry, Orwell is perhaps best-known for the dystopian 1984 and the satirical novella Animal Farm, which together have sold more copies than any two books by any other 20th century author." George Orwell therefore wrote two of the most successful works of the last century.

6

Alan Johnson says: "Well, because he [George Orwell] was a crucial part of my political development, he was central to my education, I loved his books." Alan Johnson therefore says that George Orwell had a huge influence on his way of thinking.

The speaker says: "I got him from a shelter about 7 years ago in New York City. In fact, the day that I got him I didn't even want to take home a dog that day." Therefore, at first the man had no plans to take home a dog.

1

The speaker says: "He was in the very first cage that I saw in the shelter and he was exactly the kind of dog that I wanted, so it was perfect [...]." Therefore, when the man discovered Django, he knew the dog was the kind he wanted.

2

The speaker says: "[...] but the problem was that I, I had no car. I was there on my motorcycle. So what I had to do, the only logical choice, was to take him, <u>put him in a box</u> and <u>strap him onto the back of my motorcycle</u> and take him home with me." Therefore, on the way home, Django was put in a box / Django was sitting on the motorcycle.

3

The speaker says: "So after a few weeks of working on it he was actually able to <u>ride</u> on my motorcycle <u>without a box</u>. And so this dog, Django, on the back of my motorcycle we rode everywhere [...]." Therefore, after some training Django learned to ride without a box.

4

The speaker says: "After riding from New York to Mexico, and then I took him back again and then I got called for another job in Austria." Therefore, the man left Mexico because he got another job.

5

The speaker says: "So I have to take him from Mexico to Austria, but the flight from Mexico to Austria is too long for a dog. He couldn't handle this. So I took him on the motorcycle back to New York so we can get a direct flight from New York City to Munich [...]." Therefore, by returning to the US the man was able to get a direct flight.

6

The speaker says: "I took him on the motorcycle back to New York so we can get a direct flight from New York City to Munich with Django on the bottom of the airplane, because he is too big to <u>fit in the cabin</u> of the plane." Therefore, because of his size it was impossible for Django to fit in the cabin.

7

The speaker says: "So now Django lives with me here in Vienna, Austria, where he also rides motorcycles here, which the police the other day told me that that's not particularly legal, although they thought it was cool enough that I was able to get away without getting in trouble." Therefore, in Austria the man learnt that carrying dogs on motorbikes is not particularly legal.

The speaker says: "The main building and reading rooms are open from <u>9:30</u> in the morning to 8 o'clock in the evening from Monday to Thursday." On most days, all sections of the library therefore open at 9:30 in the morning.

1

The speaker says: "Saturday, the main building and reading rooms are open from 9:30 to 5:00 o'clock. Sundays, the reading room is closed; however, the main building is open from 11 o'clock in the morning till <u>5 o'clock in the afternoon</u>." On one weekend day, visiting hours in one section therefore end at 5 o'clock.

2

The speaker says: "Conference centre events may take place <u>outside these hours</u>." Special occassions can therefore be organised outside these hours.

3

The speaker says: "The nearest tube and rail connections are <u>King's Cross</u> and <u>Euston</u>." One nearby station therefore is King's Cross or Euston.

4

The speaker says: "There is also <u>a covered area</u> for bicycles <u>on the piazza</u>." One means of transport can therefore be parked under a covered area on the piazza.

5

The speaker says: "All parts of the building are accessible by wheelchair." It is therefore possible to reach all sections of the library by wheelchair.



The speaker says: "Assistance dogs are very welcome." The library is therefore happy to allow assistance dogs.

The speaker says: "The British Library is committed to a policy of providing assistance to all our visitors and readers, not least those with disabilities." One principle of the library therefore is to support all visitors and readers

4 Be bear smart

The speaker says: "Never approach or crowd a bear. Just admire it from a safe distance, if they do, in fact, approach you on the trails or at your campsite." Therefore, if you see a bear, keep well away from it.

1

The speaker says: "And never feed a bear. This is one of the big mistakes that campers make. You never want to leave out trash, leave out food, don't wear strong perfume or make-up if you are going out on the hiking trails. Now for campers, just keep your campsite clean, you shouldn't have any problems." Therefore, if you stay in a tent, you should tidy up and remove garbage.

2

The speaker says: "If you do see a bear, there are a few things that you'll want to remember: stop, remain calm, assess the situation, do not turn and run. This may <u>prompt the bear to chase you</u>." Therefore, trying to flee can make a bear want to catch you.

3

The speaker says: "If the bear becomes aware of you, just calmly identify yourself as a human by talking to it in a low voice, well, waving your arms slowly as you back away. Avoid direct eye contact as this may inspire a confrontational reaction." Therefore, if a bear spots you, speak quietly.

4

The speaker says: "And if you are going in a group, don't let anyone straggle, <u>always stay</u> together and watch out for one another." Therefore, if you are hiking with other people, do not split up.

5

The speaker says: "If the threatened bear does make contact with you, <u>fall to the ground</u> <u>playing dead</u>. Lie with your face down, legs slightly apart, with your head between your elbows." Therefore, if a bear that feels in danger goes for you, drop and stay still and flat.

6

The speaker says: "This bear might not even notice you at first, but do not turn and run unless reaching safety is guaranteed. You don't want to make a bear follow you. <u>Stand your ground until the bear leaves</u>." Therefore, if you see a bear that is not aware of you, do not move before the bear disappears.

7

The speaker says: "If a stalking bear continues to follow you, <u>elevate yourself on a log and raise your jacket over your head to look bigger</u>, you don't want to look like easy prey, campers." Therefore, if a bear comes up behind you, pretend to be taller than you really are.

8

The speaker says: "If the bear does attack you, <u>fight back with anything at hand: your binoculars, rocks, pepper spray, hunting knifes. Strike the bear's eyes and nose, kick and yell, be defenceless [sic], campers, you are fighting for your life." Therefore, if you have to defend yourself physically, attack the bear.</u>
